A Review of Curriculum Areas

Coordinator: Mr Kearney

Religious Education

The Grow in Love programme was fully implemented and reinforced from P. 1-7. All classes prepared assemblies each week throughout the 3 terms in line with Rights Respecting Topics/Themes and religious themes. We had an Opening of the academic year mass in September in school in 2022. Primary 4 children prepared for and celebrated First Holy Communion in June 2023 and Sacrament of Penance in March 2023. The Primary 7 children celebrated Confirmation in St Peters in April 2023. All celebrated with Fr Joseph and Deacon Kevin.

We had an end of year mass/assembly for Primary 7's in June with parents/guardians able to attend. Mr Kearney and 4 P.7 children attended the Catholic Schools week mass in Banbridge in January 2023.

Teachers used the front display board (foyer) to reflect the ethos of our school and to incorporate RRS and religion themes to the whole school. October – Rosary/ Advent in December/ May altar// Transition month etc

Mrs Joan Aldridge (EI) supported our school and congratulated the staff and children for the on-going work in developing faith in the school community, especially during the ongoing pandemic. She also trained staff in new Flourish programme in school in May 2023.

Literacy

Coordinator: Mrs Mulholland

Literacy is always a prominent feature in the SDP. Much time has been spent previously on the organisation of reading within the school and this year the focus was on developing components of reading and developing a robust support programme within the school.

This was achieved and is very evident in the progress made by analysis of data from PTE.

This progress was aided by the following

Term 1

- Staff training prepared by EA and delivered to all staff by Literacy Coordinator in August on ways to develop reading Training was delivered on the following elements
 - o Term 1 Vocab,
 - o Term2 Graphic organisers,
 - o Term 3 reciprocal reading-
- Staff training organised by coordinator on using ACC reader targets and given by Renaissance - staff encouraged to set individual targets for reading using system outlined in ACC reader
- Monthly Planning monitored in Term 1 and feedback given to all staff
- Planning Framework being used by all staff for literacy staff needed reminded about appropriate template
- Inventory of Big Cat books in school been given out to all staff to record Big Cat books read
 by pupils
- Handwriting letter formation agreed for all letters/handwriting books given out to appropriate yeargroups where there were gaps
- Comprehensive programme in place for support to include Toe by Toe and Reading Partnership
- Dyslexia Screener administered for specific children and information shared with parents

Term 2-

- \bullet Book fair organised-£1200 raised and money used to purchase novels P6 and P3 and top up reading books in P3
- World book day organised and celebrated with prizes given out for competition
- Millionaire Readers rewarded
- Paired Reading programme developed with P7 and P4 and carried out for 6 weeks

Term 3

- Assessment timetable for GL assessment issued
- Data analysed charted progress made in current school year and action set out for low/under achievers for the coming year
- Year groups to level children in Communication
- Attended training in talking into writing with Pie Corbett
- Business in Community reading started with Carol Lavery working 1 session a week with EAL children from East Timor
- Analysis of data to liaise with LTSS through Ed Psych to try and continue support with LTSS

Mathematics and Numeracy

Coordinator: Mrs McNeill

The 2 targets stated on the 2022/23 Numeracy Action Plan were:

- 1. Pupils will be given the opportunity to explain their mathematical thinking and reasoning using appropriate mathematical language
- 2. Pupils will be expected to develop their mathematical language / vocabulary through the explanation of tasks

Annually, as numeracy co-ordinator, I carry out action to raise standards, due to union action, this year was limited, therefore these targets have not been fully achieved. I have been unable to monitor the targets, normally I would undertake a book scoop, focus group and monitor monthly planners, but due to staff participating in action short of strike I have been unable to conduct any of these to monitor and assess the progress of these targets. At various staff meetings teachers

were reminded of the need to promote and develop vocabulary in line with the targets on the action plan. All classes were encouraged to have a 'Maths Wall' to promote and develop vocabulary and for the children to use as a reference / support area.

Throughout this year, numeracy was developed further throughout the school by the continuation of:

- · ENGAGE Programme for Numeracy ran for 2.5 days per week with Mr Stubberfield supporting children from P4 P7, these groups were assessed, monitored and amended each term. This programme was invaluable in helping to promote a love for maths, boost self-confidence and raise standards in numeracy throughout the school, it has successfully targeted underachieving children.
- · During term 2 Numeracy catch-up programme completed with 2 children in P3 by Mrs O'Neill
- · Continued use of Mathletics and Mathseeds with monthly rewards, two great online resources, benefitting all children greatly especially for the online homework one night per week.
- · As a coordinator I regularly use data to identify areas of school focus, track performance and identify underachievers, scrutiny of PTM data has allowed me to understand and address the strengths and areas of development for the whole school and individual class. I am currently

analysing results from PTM testing conducted in May 2023 throughout the school and will use this data to identify any underachievers that we will try to target next year, budget constraints may make this more challenging.

The World Around Us Coordinator: Mr Barrett

In the subject of World Around Us in the academic year 2022-2023 we have planned, consulted and reviewed, with class teachers, six topic areas for each class focused on the strands of the NI Curriculum. Throughout each term class teachers were sent lesson resources and opportunities to engage with outside agencies to enhance their World Around Us lessons and planners. We have also purchased new Lego coding equipment, STEM items and visited W5 through the Royal Academy Engineering Grant of £2800.00 to help develop our children's knowledge in these areas. Our Eco Councillors were elected at the beginning of the year and completed their action plan during our first monthly meeting. As the year progressed our Eco Councillors completed a poster audit and water audit, collected daily water meter readings, planted wild flowers and daffodils, completed a litter pick and continued our 'Plastic Pledge' run by NI Water to reduce the use of single use plastic water bottles in our school. Moreover, we now have our very own clothing bank at school to help us recycle our old clothes and in turn raise money for our Eco initiatives! All of this hard work by our eco council educated our children on the importance of looking after our environment and helped us achieve the coveted Eco Green Flag for our school for the next two years!

Moreover, we have also been successful in achieving a Northern Ireland Pollinator Grant of £4800.00, A Living Spaces Grant of £4800.00 and the Edina Trust grant of £700 for the next two years to help us renovate our Sensory Garden, outdoor classroom and create our very own pollinator trail around our school. This project is progressing well and should be completed by the end of June 2023.

The targets listed below that were identified on the 2022/23 ICT Action Plan were fully achieved.

- 1. To enhance teachers' confidence and skills in the use of various coding apps/ programs to enable them to use confidently as a learning and teaching tool.
- 2. To ensure progression in coding from P1 P7

All teaching staff received online training from AmmA Centre (Jamie Kelly FS/KS1 or James Breen KS2) in August 2022 as part of a school development day. These skills were then transferred into the classroom in Term 2.

Mrs Daly accompanied Mrs McNeill to the AmmA Centre in September 2022 as part of the ALC Coding Training session provided by Jamie Kelly, this training was disseminated to staff through a staff meeting.

P5 and P7 took part in National Coding Week ran by the Nerve Centre in Belfast and completed various class workshops which the children found very beneficial and enjoyable.

During Term 2 all classes chose a Coding activity (CCEA Task) linked to Literacy or Numeracy to complete with their class, samples of work were provided to coordinator.

P3 participated in a Coding workshop with Jamie Kelly in March 2023 and created Minibeast projects /games with the support of Jamie this was thoroughly enjoyed by all pupils, teachers attended throughout the day to get some hands on experience of Scratch Jr.

P6 had an engaging in-school Minecraft Education workshop in June 2023 with Jamie Kelly, another opportunity to promote their coding and computational skills through a game-based platform inspiring creative learning through play.

I am continually trying to promote ICT and keep up to date with an ever-changing technological world. Some other initiatives that had been untaken include:

- Coordinator ran competition in February for Safer Internet Day to coincide with Safer Schools App and encourage parental participation on the app.
- Seesaw has continued to be an essential free communication tool announcements are sent to parents regularly using class and parent/family seesaw accounts, this tool has helped to reduce the amount of paper thus promoting our eco school. It also reduces teacher time photocopying notes etc.
- The new school website continues to be used as a further means of communication between school and home, this has been very successful and all staff update class pages on a regular basis to keep families updated with what is happening in school, there have been lots of positive comments from staff and parents regarding the website.
- 70 end of life devices have been removed from the school network, so fundraising (Easter Fun Run and Smarties Challenge) was undertaken to try to raise much needed funds to replace some of these devices, quotes have been received as £685 per device, so currently analysing this and deciding upon the best method of replacement.
- Had an site quotation done but Niavac to get a price (Price £1,119.60 ex VAT) for changing the current VGA setup to a HDMI connection in school hall to allow for the projector and sound system to be used more effectively.

Foundation Stage Play

Time was allocated to FS Teachers and Assistants for discussion, planning and evaluation each Friday afternoon. The recommended play planning format was used in FS and needs to be further developed in each class next year.

Our outdoor play resources/environment- repositioned to improve outdoor play. On evaluation of play areas, Primary 3 class need to be involved in timetable to utilise the play areas both indoor/outdoor. This needs to be incorporated each year in FS.

Coordinator: Mr Kearney

Special Educational Needs KS2

The reviewed IEP format was implemented and Mr K and Miss L attended PLP training in Term 2 by EA. ASOS has hindered the delivery of rolling this out this year but we hope to use a SDD in August to support staff. Teachers agreed to use 2 IEP/PLP format as recommended from SENCO training (targets from Action Plans). Training was held in school for ASD (Term 1), Level 3 Nurturing Programme (Term 2) and GIMME 5 (Term 3).

Throughout Term 1-2, small group withdrawals for Maths and Literacy was facilitated by Mr Stubberfield through the DE Engage programme and the P1 $^{\sim}$ P3 teachers withdrawal groups continued on 2-3 afternoons during the week. Engage funding ceased at Easter 2023 and the impact was felt during Term 3. Parents/teachers and children praised the school/work of the Engage programme via the questionnaires for our SDP over next 3 years.

The assistants continued the delivery of Motor Sensory Skills for children each Mon and Tues morning. A timetable was drawn up each term to deliver the programme to children identified by class teachers. All parents were notified each term.

Reading Partnership and Numeracy Catch Up programmes were delivered as appropriate. Mrs Mulholland Mrs McNeill organised these groupings. Parents notified.

Mr Kearney/Miss Lyttle and all teachers given day out of class – to work on PLP. (money out of SEN allocation to schools)

Even though EPS hrs reduced this year from 19 to 13hrs, the Educational Psychologist worked with a number of children (3) as did a member of the RISE Support Team (2 children) and school Counsellor worked with 15 individual children and transition sessions with P.7s. Money from Happy Healthy Minds money – which ceased at Easter 2023.

The SEN Register was updated throughout the year by both SENCO's.

Some children have been removed from the Code of Practice/Register in the school – but will be kept under review. 2 x more children SAR1 form (Stage 2) completed and sent to EA/SEN for statutory assessment.

Mr Kearney employed 1 new C/asst due to increased needs of children in FS (P.1). Money out of SEND funding and school costing helped to facilitate this.

Special Educational Needs (F/KS1) -

Coordinator - Miss Lyttle

During the academic year 22/23 Mr Kearney and myself both received PLP training from EA. ASOS encourages members to access training but are advised against implementation of new PLP format. We hope that in allocating time to the purposes of PLP completion within DTB the staff will work to implement the new initiative of PLPs. The Individualised Education Plan (IEP) is to be replaced with the new PLP. To date, there has been no formalisation of the new proposal

by EA, but the training received looks likely to be the recommended format for individual pupil provision for learners with SEN.

The aim of this year's Action Plan for SEN is to begin to support staff in phasing out IEPs and begin to familiarise themselves with the new format. It is hoped that through training and capacity building staff will feel increasingly confident. The actions require significant time allocation and will require considerable time to be dedicated to data transfer if staff are to be able to engage in the proposed Action Plan.

This year we experienced significant SEN levels within the current Primary 1 cohort. So far, we have liaised with parents to determine appropriate pathways to identifying need and have made referrals to appropriate outside agencies including EPS, Behaviour Support and RISE.

Currently there is one child with a proposed statement of SEN and a further child being referred for statementing. It is hoped that each of these children will receive additional allocation of support to allow them to access the NI curriculum effectively. This year, I had the opportunity to visit each of our feeder schools and discuss next years cohort in preparation for identifying SEN.

Staff have willingly engaged in several training opportunities during this year, and many have shown interest in further training if it should become available.

Pastoral care

The Voice of St Teresa's representatives were elected and ground rules for meetings agreed. (voted by chn in P.4-7) Mr Kearney/ Mrs Fox and Mrs Loney met with pupils half termly to discuss ideas to help improve the school. A noticeboard was used to display and communicate ideas to all in school. Head Boy and Head Girls and their deputies played a vital role during 60 years celebrations, Catholic Schools Week Mass, P1 Induction days etc throughout the year.

Counsellor (Mrs Jane McGeary) worked with families/children throughout the year. She supported teachers on 1:1 level too.

Children had the opportunity to discuss anti bullying strategies/filled in questionnaires and the policy

was reviewed.

Class, bus and school rules were discussed, agreed, implemented and disseminated to all families.

All staff were reminded to log in /out of schools when entering/exiting the school. New ipad at school

door used to record information safely.

A number of Case Conferences and Review Plan meetings were attended by Mrs Mulholland/Mr Kearney via zoom/teams.

P.3 day was extended each Mon and Tues from April –June 2022 until 3pm, to help transitioning for P.4. A positive change as supported by parents/staff and children welcomed it too. It allowed for additional time to be spent with outdoor play and Activity Based Learning.

Shared Education Signature Project

Shared Education this year has been a reintroduction to the programme for all involved following the last few years which were impacted by COVID-19.

During the academic year 2022/2023 the focus was very much on reconnecting the staff and engaging the adults in the programme.

For the first time since 2020 we have successfully completed the intended outcomes with the focus this time being on the pupils.

Like in many years, Shared Education had a structural review for this academic year and while the training was limited it was very clear about the expected outcomes and goals. The intention to engage pupils has been successfully achieved this year and both schools have completed 100% of the intended face to face visits.

Eight members of staff and seventy-two children from St. Teresa's engaged in the programme this year alongside PIPS who had almost two hundred participants across all their P1, P2 and P3 classes. This more than surpasses the EA directive for rates of participation.

It is intended that for the academic year 2023/24 the new intake of Primary 1 pupils from each school will continue to engage in Shared Education following the same format as this year. The programme will extend to include Primary 4 children and staff.

There remains, however, uncertainty as to how the next academic year will be accessible for our partnership due to the proposed reduction in financial support. Given the distance between the two schools it is not feasible to continue the programme without money for transport. To date we are waiting for updated financial information for the next academic year. This will guide our school for next years Action Planning and the Shared Education programme for our partnership.
